The KCDC Advisor Arts, Museums and Heritage, Rosie Salas, continues to be very supportive and is organizing a heritage board to explain the story behind the artwork elements which will be affixed alongside the mural.

During the last month we have benefited from the input of a young world traveller, Ignacio Miranda, from Argentina. Ignacio is a qualified IT communications expert with a particular interest in museums. It was only natural that he popped into our museum while he stayed on the Kapiti Coast for a few weeks and offered to help wherever we needed it. He says he has been learning things as well, and never more so than when he assisted Judy Grayson-Moore and her team host 58 excited junior pupils from Kapakapanui School at the Museum for a school visit!
